
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BORN AND LIVED: Born in Washington DC and have lived in Montreal, Ann Arbor, Philadelphia and currently in New Jersey.

HOW/WHERE DO I SEE THE INDUSTRY IN FIVE YEARS: The Open Access movement continues to gain traction on campuses. Science disciplines will continue to advocate for the OA movement, impact factors will continue to improve for open access journal titles, and the push for increased scientific transparency to address concerns of reproducibility will continue to push the OA movement forward. University and library sponsored article processing charge funds are being drained demonstrating an interest in making articles OA. Ultimately, the barriers for accessing scientific literature will continue to diminish.

EARLY LIFE: My father was a Civil Engineer, but today would be considered a Computer Engineer. He was one of the first to apply computer programming to city planning.

PROFESSIONAL CAREER AND ACTIVITIES: I started Conquest Systems in 1990 to build products. I think that integration of data has to be seamless and transparent. I expect that over the coming years, we will continue to advance in building bridges for data usage by implementing a common framework that allows other internal and external applications to uniformly access and integrate data.

HOW/WHERE DO I SEE THE INDUSTRY IN FIVE YEARS: The traditional reference and technical services librarian roles have been broadened to clinical librarian, instruction librarian, outreach/consumer health librarian, and then further to extended embedded librarians, informationist, systematic review librarian, emerging technologies librarian, continuing medical education librarian, data management librarian, digital librarian, scholarly communication librarian, translational research librarian, and user experience librarian. 
PET PEEVES: People that stand on the left side of the elevator and block people from passing them.

My hope is that in five years at least 75% of all new research papers will be freely available online immediately. 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HOW/WHERE DO I SEE THE INDUSTRY IN FIVE YEARS: In the library metadata field, hopefully we'll have made improvements to some of the data silos and discovery challenges we're currently faced with. We'll need to remain focused on implementing linked data, improving the interoperability of our systems and data standards, and continuously assessing our discovery and delivery services to ensure that they meet the needs of our users.

- With the increase in online and database spending, the role of a subscription agency becomes even more important. Working with multiple publishers and different systems will continue to be a challenge. For example, when online access lapses, Prenax has a team of E-Resource members that work closely with our clients and publishers to ensure continuity in client access. Service for online issues require immediate action and that's what Prenax offers clients now and will continue to.
- Subscription management agencies will continue to assist in providing single sign-on and multi-user availability as more third party companies emerge.

HISTORY AND BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF YOUR COMPANY/PUBLISHING PROGRAM: Guided by an unwavering dedication to academia and an entrepreneurial spirit, the passionate and determined Sara Miller McCune founded SAGE Publishing in 1965 just a few months shy of her 24th birthday. Also, we recently redesigned and relaunched SAGE Research Methods (SRM), our comprehensive digital methods resource accessed through the campus library, and launched a collection of videos that illustrate how research is done as a part of SRM.

From our first methods journals in 1972 to the QASS and QRM series published since the 1970s (aka the "Little Green Books" and "Little Blue Books"), to the launch of SRM in 2011, and our expanding support of data-intensive social science research; we've been honored to serve social scientists at the forefront of research methods publishing for more than four decades. And we are dedicated to supporting librarians as they support researchers, students, and instructors through this journey.

IS THERE ANYTHING ELSE YOU THINK OUR READERS SHOULD KNOW? Libraries have become places that aren't just about the stuff we have, like books or computers, but about what we empower people to do. It's a place where anyone's ideas can come to life.

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access. (If this tool were to exist, it would put great pressure in favor of more open access.) It will know where things are and how to get them — in the sense that it will know what is analog material available by interlibrary loan, what is analog material only available to onsite visitors, what is digital material that requires some kind of ongoing financial relationship with the provider (a subscription or a license), what is digital material that's available for some kind of by-the-drink payment, and what is digital material that is openly accessible. And it will know what to do in order to enable the user to access and use that material — and it will do it for me. Our local delivery systems will need to integrate with the disintegrated library system well enough to perform the fulfillment function.

Doesn't that give us a chance for the DLS — Disintegrated Library System? Run our business of buying and tracking with one system, provide access to data about the things that we happen to contribute to the global information space with another, and let the discovery system do all the hard stuff? Am I nuts? 🍷

worked closely for nearly 20 years and **Elsevier** already uses the **Editorial Manager** platform for a significant number of journals, including its high profile **Cell Press** portfolio and many society titles.
